


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

"The LEADER'S EDGE" by drmichaelbell

I've been in church leadership, in some capacity, for a minute or two and I've discovered that there's a truckload of truth in the adage that goes "What got you here won't get you there." We're barreling, seemingly at warp speed, to the end of 2021 and, as a church leader, you probably (hopefully) have already done about 75% of the planning for 2022. And I know at least some of you reading this are asking " How on earth do l/we plan in an environment like this?"

Here's what goes on under my thinking cap as I think about what got me here not getting me there:

- The strategies I used in the past appear to have had some traction...can't those same strategies just work again?
- Do I have the energy or even want to rethink everything again?
- If I can get incremental results doing what I'm doing now, why can't I just continue to "ride on the horse I rode in on?"

As soon as I hear myself think along these lines I immediately realize that what helped the church or ministry I lead make progress in the past won't work as effectively in the future. We're still in the vise grip of a global pandemic with a mounting body count. There are seismic social and economic shifts occurring at the same time. With these and other pressing issues intruding on and frequently disrupting the rhythm of our daily lives, it's almost a given that the years ahead will be years of big change for almost everyone: church leaders and business leaders alike

So what adjustments do church leaders need to make to meet the challenges ahead?

For one thing, you have to be open in the midst of change, stagnation, dislocation and decline. Stay open to new ways of thinking, new approaches, different perspectives, and new processes. Let's call this "leadership agility." Leadership agility is the capacity and capability to take effective action in complex,



rapidly evolving contexts. It requires leaders to have a learning posture - learning from God. learning each other and learning from some unfamiliar resources in other arenas.

- Another adjustment you, a leader, have to make is that you have to cultivate your ability to recover quickly from difficulties. In other words you have to develop buoyancy, which is another word for resilience. Resilience is the ability to adapt and bounce back in the face of adversity, trauma, tragedy, threats, and/or distress. To become a resilient leader you must:
- Stop your negative thought cvcles.
- Know your strengths and use them.

Embrace change.


This is not an exhaustive list, just a primer to get you started.

One more thing. Effective church leaders, whether clergy or laity are big picture thinkers who can rise above the day-to-day and see things from a more expansive perspective. Big picture thinkers have the ability to get people excited about where they're going and how to get there; they are innovative, perceptive, and creative.

I hope these thoughts will get you started in the right direction as you make church/ministry plans for the new year.

We endeavor to shower others with gifts such as food, clothes, toys, etc. We endeavor to sow seeds of kindness upon the homeless, orphaned, sick and shut in, bereaved, widowed, etc. We all know that the greatest, most cherished gift we could ever give anyone is the gift of Christ. 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AMERICA, GET BETTER NOT BITTER. A Texas Pastor and Wife Create Coffee Project To Help Stimulate The Inner-City Economy and Help America Get Better Not Bitter

FORT WORTH, TEXAS | Pastor Kyev Tatum and his wife Tonya of the New Mount Rose Missionary Baptist Church of Fort Worth, Texas have been on a mission since May 2018 to help change the trajectory of life expectancy in the 76104 community of his birth.

In April 2019, researchers from UT Southwestern in Dallas discovered that

these historically black neighborhoods of East 76104 have the lowest life expectancy in the entire state of Texas at 67 years, with black males with the lowest life expectancy rate at 64 years. Since then, the Tatum have been gathering community leaders, elected officials, and subject matter experts to help identify, isolate and increase services to eliminate the problem areas.

Then in February 2020, the Coronavirus Pandemic hit the world and like everyone else the Tatum were moved with compassion and duty, created the New Mount Rose Bowl, a public, private, faith-based outreach distribution hub to provide fresh food, personal protection equipment, medical support for Covid-19 recovery including boosters, flu shots, testing, vaccinations, and the latest and up to date accurate information from Health and Human Services and the Center for Disease Control.

By February 2021, the New Mount Rose Bowl had distributed over 10 million dollars in complimentary pandemic supplies and services to over 100 churches, social clubs, childcare facilities, and other community organizations seeking support during this unprecedented time.

On February 15, 2021, the winter storm hit Texas hard and devastated the church building. The entire church

was impacted and a major renovation was set to begin.

While the church was under repair, Pastor Tatum received a called from the Biden Administration's Region 6, Health and Human Services asking if our church could help improve the awareness and education to increase vaccination rates in isolated communities of color that have a historic mistrust of the government. Since then, Pastor Tatum and the GodSquad have been traveling across the city spreading confidence and encouragement to help build confidence back into the community.

In June 2021, in collaboration with USA Drug Testing of Plano, the New Mount Rose Bowl created the Faith At The Plate COVID Recovery Popup Hubs at several different churches in isolated communities to increase vaccinations for isolated under vaccinated communities This model is gaining national traction and is currently seeking funding to continue the work.

To help build economy capacity for these exciting initiatives, Pastor and Sister Tatum created the Inner-City Coffee Exchange and Ballpark Coffee in collaboration with the Texas A&M University Center for Coffee Research and Education, Texas Rangers Baseball Club, and What's the Buzz Coffee. This new economic stimulus strategy has created a coffee cooperative and coffee festival designed to stimulate the economy, percolate possibilities, and cultivate conversations within confrontations as we promote diversity, equity, and inclusion in the specialty coffee industry.

This first of it's kind mutual benefit association will economically benefit international small coffee farmers, rural researchers and enterprisers, and inner-city families and independent small startup coffee shop owners

HymnFest. The night would be



Let's Talk About Worthiness!

Let's talk about worthiness. I grew up in church and I am the result of both the many benefits and the drawbacks of traditional church teaching. I am successful. Another truth: I suffer heavily from impostor syndrome. Impostor syndrome is a phenomenon in which a high-achieving person (by most standards) feels that their successes in life occur by chance or happenstance. A person that suffers from impostor syndrome feels like a fraud, like they are living a life they do not deserve, like all the amazing things they achieved have absolutely nothing to do with them or anything they have done.

Saved people are too often taught that they are undeserving of the good that comes their way. Some traditional church teachings portray Christians to be these unworthy beings. I grew up in church believing that every single good thing that happened to me had absolutely nothing to do with me. I felt like the wins in my life were by happenstance, or "God-magic" and not the result, even if just in part. of God intentionally creating me to be amazing and capable, and that he had given me the ability, or authority, to put in the work and reap the benefits of all of that.

Faith isn't really much at all without work. Merely just believing in God does not really amount to much. The New Testament is



filled with instances of people being healed by their faith, but for most of them, it was never really just their faith. Their faith fueled them to make moves outside of what ordinary people would do. They had to put in work. They had to take a few steps towards what they were asking God for. The woman with the issue of blood had to press through a crowd and grab the hem of Jesus' garment. The mother whose child was demon-possessed had to beg and plead her case as to why, as a Gentile woman, she and her daughter deserved Jesus' time, attention, and blessing. John 4 tells the story of Jesus curing a nobleman's son after he was the noble man begged Him. He put in work by finding out where Jesus was and then refusing to take "no" for an answer.

God expects us to put in work in expectation of something amazing happening. We work toward what we want knowing that (i) God is working on the inside of us; (ii) God is working around us; (iii) at the very minimum we will get what we asked for because we worked toward it, and (iv) God will do more than what we expected because he does exceedingly abundantly above what we ask or think according to the God's authority working inside of us. Thus, the amazing things happening to us are not by happenstance. They are the result of our work, and God's work in us.

Hopefully the takeaway is that unworthiness is not what God desires for us to feel. You are worthy. Your hard work matters. Your effort matters. Your faith matters. You matter. You are chosen. You are royal. You are part of a holy nation. You are salt. You are light. You are the head and not the tail. You are above and not beneath. You are a lender and not a borrower. You are more than a conqueror. You are an overcomer. You are a child of God. You are a friend of God. You were made with fear and wonder. You were made in the image of God. You are God's workmanship. You are forgiven. You are redeemed. You are a jointheir with Christ. You are a new creature. You are blessed. You are whole. You are complete. You lack nothing. You are worthy of good things. You are alive. You are beautiful. You are precious. MOST IMPORTANTLY, you are LOVED!



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
